

Safety at Santos GLNG

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This fact sheet provides information about the safe management of the Santos GLNG facility on Curtis Island.

Our Environment Health and Safety Management System provides a strong foundation for achieving safety compliance under both the *Work Health and Safety Act 2011* and the *Petroleum and Gas (Production and Safety) Act 2004* and other regulations.

Safety is our number one priority, and we will operate the Santos GLNG facility on Curtis Island off Gladstone in accordance with relevant legislation and our EHS management systems. This safety governance structure produces a consistent and aligned approach to safety management, with the goal of achieving industry best practice safety performance that incorporates world-class systems to prevent incidents.

Santos GLNG is working collaboratively with the two other LNG companies, emergency services and local authorities to ensure we are well prepared for any safety challenge.

Initiatives involve transportation, emergency response and contractor management.

Facility location

The facility is located within the Gladstone State Development Area on the southern side of Curtis Island.

The facility is over 3km from the nearest residence and there is no public access to the site.

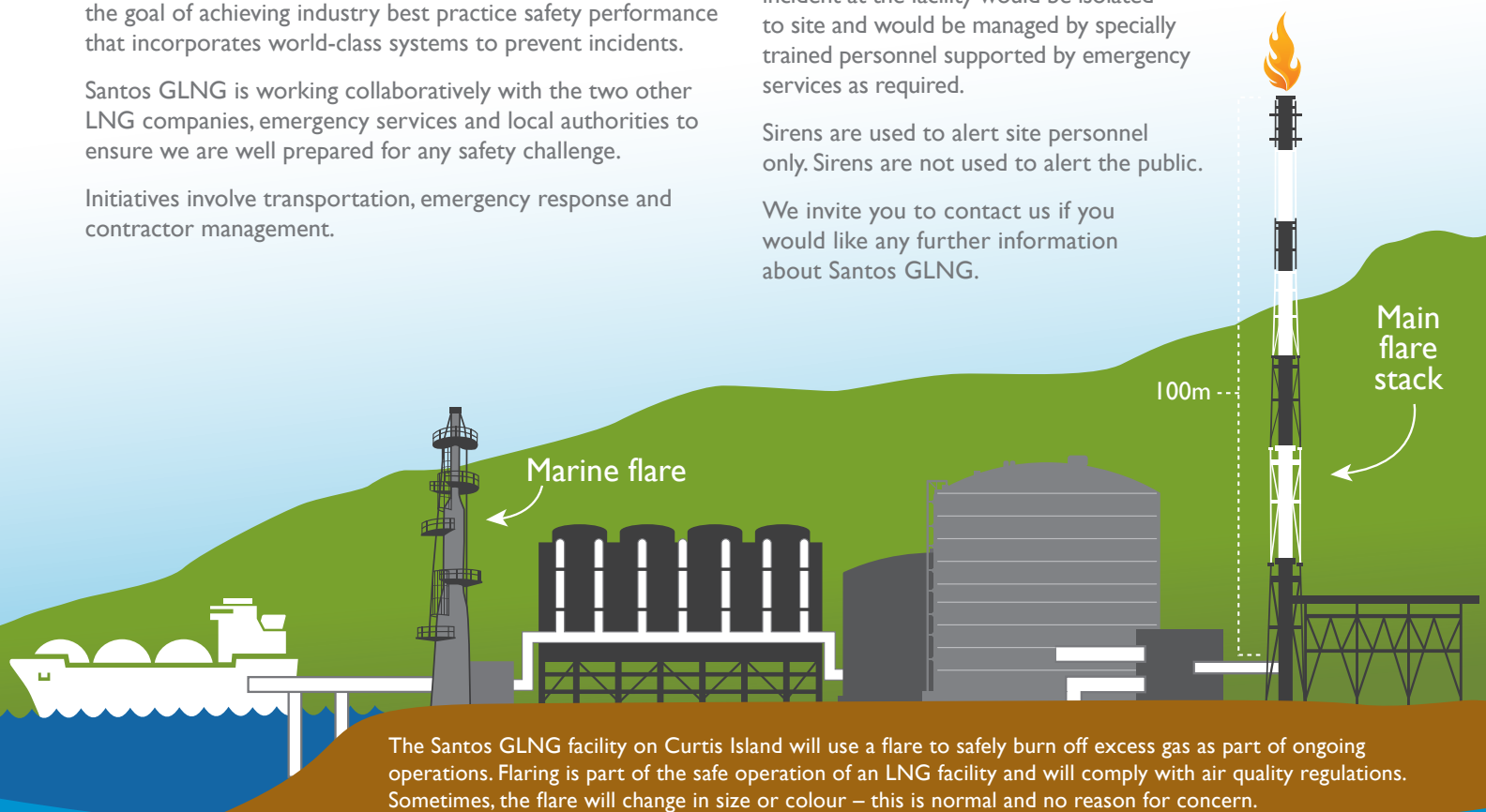
Emergency response

The location of Santos GLNG means that any potential incident, including those caused by natural events, would likely be contained to site and would not affect the local community.

Accordingly, the response to any potential incident at the facility would be isolated to site and would be managed by specially trained personnel supported by emergency services as required.

Sirens are used to alert site personnel only. Sirens are not used to alert the public.

The Santos GLNG facility on Curtis Island will use a flare to safely burn off excess gas as part of ongoing operations. Flaring is part of the safe operation of an LNG facility and will comply with air quality regulations. Sometimes, the flare will change in size or colour – this is normal and no reason for concern.

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Safety case: incident prevention and management

The GLNG Safety Case, which complies with the *Work Health and Safety Act 2011*, provides a comprehensive analysis of potential incidents and risks that could lead to an incident, and outlines the control measures in place.

We have put in place control and risk reduction measures to ensure that risks are reduced to as low as reasonably practicable and have implemented an Environment, Health and Safety Management System (EHSMS) which is used to manage operations safely, and to minimise the potential site and off-site impacts.

Potential incidents identified in the Santos GLNG Safety Case:

- Loss of containment of natural gas
- Loss of containment of LNG
- Loss of containment of refrigerant
- Loss of containment of hot oil

In addition to incidents isolated to site, the facility has detailed response plans for natural disasters and security threats.

The Santos GLNG Safety Case complies with the *Queensland Work Health and Safety Act 2011*.
